Paper title: Poetry – III: 20th Century

Paper title: Prose and Fiction – III

This course aims at familiarizing the students with twentieth-century prose and fiction. Both the genres are significant for their thematic and stylistic experiments. The students would be required to study these texts thoroughly and have a careful understanding of the modernist and postmodernist tendencies that led to the emergence of more complex literary approaches and traditions later and that are felt to be at work in them. Equally important it is for them to identify the techniques of narrative and style evident in most of the twentieth-century works of fiction.
